

Background questions

1. Can you afford to eat at least two meals a day?
2. Did you receive secondary school education?
3. Do you and your family live in a secure, well serviced and spacious place?
4. Are you heard in extended family meetings?
5. Can you influence where a well should be built in your village?
6. Are you safe from violence?
7. Untimely rain has destroyed your crop. Can you afford to buy a fresh batch of inputs?
8. Are you able to access institutional credit?
9. The government has made a new agricultural subsidy for the poor. Are you able to access it?

Capability questions

1. Do you have access to the market to sell your produce directly?
2. The government has a new SMS service to provide a 3-day climate forecast. Will you be able to access the information?
3. The government has launched a new drought resistant seed available at a certain cost. Would you buy these seeds?
4. A new large dam has been proposed for construction on the river in your village. Would this benefit you?
5. Can you talk to the local administration about issues affecting your agricultural land due to the construction of the dam? (those who said 'Yes' take one step forward and those who said 'No', take one step backward).
6. Local community-based organizations are proposing an alternative of a low-cost, community-based rainwater harvesting structure to address the drought situation. Would you prefer this?

Enablers/Detractors

1. B5 - Patriarchy – young female poor farmer – Facilitator to push back
2. B9 - Microfinance + Bank (Facilitator to push back or move forward)
3. C3 - Biotech+Govt. (Facilitator to push back)
4. C4- World Bank – the poor farmer will be pushed out to be a landless farmer – Facilitator moves the character to another lane

5. C6 – NGO – Facilitator moves forward those farmers who said ‘Yes’
